## The Six Things I Learned from Watching the LPGA Match Play Tournament

- 1. There is no right or wrong with the pin. This is once again the question during rounds. Some people take the pin out and others leave it in. There is no right or wrong, just personal preference.
- Etiquette. There is never an issue with their etiquette. Between the players and the caddies, everyone knows their place. They follow golf etiquette perfectly. We should all strive to behave like the pros.
- No Movement. When you watch them swing, there is absolutely no extraneous movement. No swaying. No over swinging. Their head does not move up or down nor back during their backswing. They swing the club around their bodies and their spine. That's probably why even their misses are so good. The variability from swing to swing is miniscule.
- 4. Pre-Shot. They do their pre-shot routine. And they do it again on the next shot. It doesn't change. They prepare the exact same way before every shot. They don't let pressure change their pre-shot routine. They may get flustered on the inside, but you'd never know it on the outside.
- 5. **Trouble-Trouble.** They occasionally hit horrible shots into deep trouble just like we do. But unlike us, they always get out on the next shot. They realize that it's not over, til it's over.
- 6. Amazing Shots. Last, there isn't one aspect of their game that isn't absolutely great. Yes, they bomb their drives. Yes, they hit lots of greens in regulation. They can chip and pitch like you can't believe from any lie and they putt incredibly well. They simply don't 3-putt. It's more than "drive for show, putt for dough". They do all things well.

#### Dear Patti Patti Parker's Monthly Rules Advice Column



#### Dear Patti,

I hit my ball just short of the green, the lady I was golfing with hit her ball which then hit my ball forcing her ball to go one way and mine to go closer to the green. Where should we have placed our balls after they hit each other? Signed. Bumper Ball

#### Dear Bumper Ball,

The correct ball positioning can be found in USGA Rule 9.6. The ball that was accidentally hit <u>whether on or off the green</u> is placed back to its original spot (or as close to that spot as possible), and the ball that hit the sitting ball is then played wherever it comes to rest after hitting the other ball. There is no penalty



involved in hitting another ball from off the green. However, if a player strikes another ball at rest **while putting on the green**, the player hitting the ball is penalized two strokes since it is their responsibility to ask for balls to be marked. I highly recommend you work on hitting straighter to avoid these bumper-ball-busting-bursts.

#### On Par With Dan—Ball Position: Move it Back to Get Higher Shots



see a lot of misinformation regarding ball position, and the overwhelming majority of amateurs play the ball too far forward. It may seem counterintuitive, but to get the ball higher it usually needs to be moved further back to

create a more descending blow on the ball and increase backspin which makes the ball lift more. As the ball moves too far forward in the stance it tilts your shoulders in the wrong direction and can create a sweeping motion where players try to lift the ball in the air by leaning back and scooping. This not only leads to more fat shots, but it also doesn't create enough backspin to hold greens. So even your best shots can roll off the back.

My philosophy is what I call the "3 ball rule" for all irons which was made popular by a golfer you may have

heard of ... Tiger Woods. Line three balls up together and place the first one in the middle of the stance. The middle of the stance is for your longer irons and hybrids, the next ball back is for mid irons 6-9, and the last ball back are your wedges. The driver and fairway woods can be played inside the left heel because you are not trying to take a divot with these clubs.

Remember go back to go up!



# Congratulations

Last month's winner was Kelly King who correctly answered:

- 1. What is the process and penalty if your ball is lodged in a tree:
  - Play the ball from the tree itself by climbing into it and then hitting it out. Sergio Garcia is one of a few famous examples of players who have done this in Tour events.
  - Take an <u>unplayable lie</u> from the spot in the tree where the ball is stuck. that means a player can first declare they're going to take an unplayable lie (a must, because if you move the ball before you declare this, you'll incur another onestroke penalty), shake or remove the ball from the tree, then take two club lengths of relief from the base of the tree with a one-stroke penalty.
  - **Declare the ball lost.** The player may then go back to the original spot of the previous shot and hit it again after taking a one-stroke penalty.
- 2. You are allowed 14 clubs in your bag.
