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
Where are Your Golf Clubs Right Now?

As the holiday song says, "Baby it's cold outside." If your clubs are stored anywhere that's chilly, you should move them.



Cold = Bad

In short, the trunk of your car and/or your garage, (unless it's temperature controlled) are not where you should store your clubs. The cold will accelerate the deterioration of your



grips leading to cracking and making them prematurely slippery. It can even affect the epoxy that helps secure your clubhead to the shaft. Shafts, both graphite and metal, are best stored at room temperature. Cold makes them brittle over time. (If your golf club stores your clubs for you, make sure they are careful about the temperature of the room). The best place is find a corner of your closet, extra bedroom or office, and store your clubs there.

Clean = Good

Have you ever really cleaned your clubs I mean completing a deep clean? I'm talking about more than just swiping them with a wet rag when you're leaving the course. Grass and dirt left in the grooves will only be more difficult to remove later. Dish soap, warm water and a toothbrush work perfect. And you can use mild soap and water for most all grips, except on Winn grips, which are the exception because they're synthetic. Winn grips require water only and no scrubbing. If you live in a humid climate, you can use a *light* coat of Vaseline on the faces which will prevent rusting on your irons and wedges. However, you must wipe it off under the Rules when you play again.




New Grips?



Finally, look carefully at your grips. If you haven't replaced them in several years, it may be time. You'd be amazed at the difference new grips make. The golf stores all carry a large selection of grips. For a few bucks per club they will re-grip your clubs after you select new grips. By the way, they make some nice cushy grips that feel good on your hands. Check those out, especially if you have a little arthritis in your hands like I do.

New USGA Rules for 2023

The 2023 rules changes continue the modernization process, with an emphasis on both inclusion and sustainability. For the first time, the modified Rules for players with disabilities have been fully incorporated into the playing rules without the need to adopt a local rule. The governing bodies, supported by longstanding partner Rolex, will also promote digital and mobile app access to the Rules while significantly reducing the production and distribution of more than 4 million printed books. These rules go into effect January 1, 2023.



KEY CHANGES INCLUDE:

- **Modifications for Players with Disabilities:** The modifications to the Rules for players with disabilities have been made part of the Rules and are in effect for all players who are classified in the categories covered in Rule 25.
 - **Handicap Usage in Stroke Play:** With the continued growth of score-posting technology following the adoption of the World Handicap System™, players are no longer penalized for failing to put their handicap on their scorecard in stroke play. The committee will be responsible for ensuring the accuracy of each player's handicap.
- **Club Damaged During Round:** The Rule has been amended to allow a player to replace a club that is damaged during a round, provided the player did not damage it through abuse.
- **Ball Moved by Natural Forces:** A new exception provides that a ball at rest must be replaced if it moves to another area of the course or comes to rest out of bounds after being dropped, placed or replaced.
- **Back-on-the-Line Relief Procedure:** The back-on-the-line relief procedure, often used for penalty area and unplayable ball relief, has been simplified so that the player now drops their ball anywhere on the line, and the ball must come to rest within one club-length of where it is dropped. That club length can be in any direction (yes, that means forward!).

2023 RULES OF GOLF: 5 KEY CHANGES

The R&A and the USGA have released the most recent edition of the Rules of Golf, effective January 2023.

HERE ARE 5 KEY CHANGES

New Rule — Modifications for Players with Disabilities

These modifications are now part of the Rules and are in effect for all competitions and all players who fall under the categories covered in new Rule 25.



Ball Moved by Natural Forces

When your ball is at rest after taking relief and then rolls into another area of the course due to natural causes, there is no penalty, and you must replace it.



Replacing Damaged Clubs

If your club is damaged during a round (except in cases of abuse) you may replace it, repair it or continue to use it.



Simplified Back-on-the-Line Relief

When using this relief option, you are required to drop your ball on the line, and it may roll up to one club-length in any direction.



Handicap on Scorecard (Stroke Play Only)

You are not required to put your handicap on your scorecard and there is no penalty if you return your scorecard in a competition with an incorrect handicap, as this is now the Committee's responsibility.

This change is consistent with other penalty reductions, such as reducing the penalty for playing an incorrectly substituted ball from the general penalty to one stroke.


